### **Michele Bee, researcher and co-founder of the cultural center “Manifatture Knos”, Lecce.**

He studied economics and holds a PhD in philosophy. Recently Michele Bee teaches History of Political Thought at the University of Lausanne (Switzerland). "Manifatture Knos" (IT), an old public engineering workers' training school, was restored 2006 by citizens, artists and professionals. The centre's activities include research, training and supporting productions on artistic freedom and organizational autonomy. He collaborates with the municipality of Lecce and several associations and artists in a project based on the direct involvement of citizens in the restoration and change of a quarter of the town. He is interested in the idea of “Third landscape and third place”, a practical research on "undecided" public spaces developed/transformed directly by the citizens, without the support of facilitators. **Nataša Bodrožić, curator and cultural worker, Zagreb.** Co-founder of slobodne veze/loose associations, a contemporary art platform founded in 2009 in Croatia.
